

Flying High! Canada's First 25 Years in Space



Looking back

September 29, 1962. Alouette I. Do you remember?

DOC's Chief of Satellite Programs Graham Booth certainly does. He was the Payload Engineer involved in the actual assembly of Alouette I and was present at the Vandenberg Air Force Base launch site as Canada became the third nation in the world after the U.S. and U.S.S.R. to have a spacecraft in orbit it had designed and built.

At that time, Graham was reporting to the Telecommunications Research Sector of the Defence Research Board at the Department of National Defence, which later became CRC, and was subsequently transferred to DOC in 1969.

Since then, with the exception of ISIS-II, Graham has been involved, in one way or another, with every major Canadian satellite project.

Looking ahead

Research into this new frontier has been a necessary part of humanity's search for knowledge. But given Canada's population and economic standing, Canada needs to co-operate with other countries so it can meet all of its space objectives. Successive governments have affirmed Canada's commitment to international cooperation; as in the 1979, five-year agreement for a close working relationship with the European Space Agency. The ERS-1 and Olympus projects are currently under the umbrella of this agreement.

Olympus, an experimental highpower communications satellite, is being constructed by an international consortium in which Canadian industry and DOC play a key role.

Olympus is currently being tested at the David Florida Laboratory (DFL), and is scheduled for launch in 1989.

MSAT (Mobile Satellite) is a proposed new communications system designed to bring two-way mobile service to all Canadians by using a satellite as a relay station in space. The service is slated to begin in 1992. It was conceived by DOC to satisfy national needs for improved public and government mobile communications in isolated and sparsely populated areas.

Telesat Canada proposes to own and operate the satellite, while the government would provide technological support to manufacturers, sponsor service trials and lease capacity on the satellite.

Anik E, the 11th Canadian communications satellite, is scheduled for launch in 1990. It's designed to meet Telesat requirements to the year 2,000.

The DFL, Canada's world-class spacecraft assembly, integration and testing centre maintained and operated by the Department, has played a key role in Canada's space success. Its continuing service will be instrumental to Canadian industry and research sectors as they fulfil the goals of Canada's space plans.

On the verge of Canada's next quarter century in space, the government is now moving to establish a Canadian Space Agency which will provide new focus on Canadian efforts in space, and on Canada's ability to move aggressively into the 21st century.

A Warm Welcome to the National Museums Programs

Change, excitement, heritage, culture ... The National Museums of Canada's (NMC) National Museums Programs have been transferred to the Department of Communications, as a result of the dismantling of the National Museums Corporation.

The study of a 15th century Basque Whaling Village, restoration of the Audubon nature books valued at millions of dollars, a database network. exhibits, and technical and financial assistance to Canadian museums ... all part of the programs that joined DOC on September 1.

They are: the Museums Assistance Program, the Canadian Heritage Information Network (CHIN), the International Program, and the Canadian Conservation Institute which provides conservation treatment to museum

objects, some priceless, in publicly owned collections across Canada.

The Museums Assistance Program provides grants and technical assistance to preserve and increase public access to Canada's cultural

Computer technology used by CHIN a huge database of Canadian heritage objects - has been copied by U.S. institutions, and also by Interpol, to assist in detecting art theft.

Be on the lookout in future newsletters for more information and interesting tidbits on the programs and the people involved with this exciting addition to the Department's cultural mandate.

A Chat with Michael Binder

Michael Binder sits perched on the edge of his chair, the epitome of the consummate communicator

When asked to describe his portfolio, Binder laughs and says, "If it's not program or policy, it's Mike - supporting senior management, that's my

Binder has been with DOC for two and a half years. If you add up the number of hours he puts in each day, however, it's probably closer to three

He started his career with the federal government at the Defence Research Board as a Scientific Service Officer.

From there he moved to the Ministry of State for Urban Affairs in several positions related to policy development, program evaluation, project manage ment and planning. In 1978 Binder moved to Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation where he was Director of Research Administration and Coordination, and then Director of Operations and Audit. In 1981 he was appointed to the Office of the Comptroller General, Program Evaluation Branch, as Director, Departmental Operations Division.



In fact, while his title is Assistant Deputy Minister, Corporate Management, Binder is responsible for financial management, administration, personnel and informatics.

Canada Hosts Francophone and Commonwealth Summits

The Department of Communications is concerned with both the media and the spirit of Canadian culture. It plays a vital role in giving Canadians the tools to reach out to each other and to people around the world. It has spearheaded developments in satellite transmission, television broadcasting, computer and telephone links, and also fostered a wide range of artistic and cultural endeavors.

Communications and culture are major themes at two important summit meetings in Canada this year: the Sommet de la Francophonie, which was held in Quebec City at the beginning of this month, and the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting, to be held in Vancouver in October.

La Francophonie is an association of 41 countries in which French is an official language. The Commonwealth, comprising the United Kingdom and more than 40 former British colonies, represents more than one-quarter of the world's population. communications, but we're working on
it and working hard; it's vital to our
role here.''

He speaks proudly of the fact that during the recent government downsizing, not one person lost their job at Communications while an eight percent reduction in staff was mandated. "You never hear of it as an issue at DOC," he says.

He is also committed to cutting down on paperwork and streamlining communications within the Department. "I would like to reduce some of the silliness that goes on within the bureaucracy." As an example he cites, "that managers making \$60,000 are still not trusted with taxi chits."

His philosophy of management he says is the "opposite of what this town is used to. Rather than put up a lot of bureaucratic gates to ensure things don't go wrong — remove the gates and say 'I trust you'. It's not a risk-free approach, but hopefully it will promote a team approach — and I'm here to support the team.''


He is concerned with the tendency of senior management to be insular and is committed to obtaining feedback from what he calls "the troops."

He's approachable, likeable, and sincere in his desire to make the department management accessible and open to all in his quest to improve internal communications. "And," he concludes, "Communications Express is the perfect vehicle to which everyone in the Department can contribute."

His summation of the Department? "I love this place; it's weird but wonderful."

Headquarters Fitness Program Still Going Strong

Thirteen years ago a handful of DOC employees decided it was time to become more physically active, and a department fitness program began. For four years the group met at the Ottawa Boys and Girls Club on Nepean Street, during lunch hour. Exercise classes for 25 or 30 people, mostly men, were organized by Fitness Canada staff.



Darlene Simms usually leads employee fitness classes in the basement of DOC headquarters, but for Sneaker Day, the inaugural event of Canada Fitness Week, she was asked to lead a 15-minute workout on Parliament Hill.

In 1977, after the move to the Journal North Tower, a basement stockroom was converted into space for fitness classes. Weight training and other equipment for individual exercise was added later.

Today the Program is still gaining in popularity. There are over 425 participants, including 275 DOC employees, taking part in 18 classes per week. Sixteen qualified DOC volunteer staff, all ''graduates'' of the Program, are the instructors, and they're looking for more members.

HDTV Colloquium

What will television look like in the '90s? That's the question experts from around the world will be discussing at the Ottawa Congress Centre from October 5-8, at a conference cosponsored every two years by the Department of Communications, the CBC, the National Film Board (NFB) and Telesat Canada.

Communications Research Centre staff have been at work for some time now, organizing The Third International Colloquium On Advanced Television Systems. This year, following the technical conference, public demonstrations of High Definition Television will be staged in Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal, New York, Washington D.C., and Los Angeles. Metin Akgun and André Vincent (DIP), Gérald Chouinard, René Voyer and John Storey of Systems and Networks Research (DCN), and Dorothy Phillips and Paul Hearty of Behavioural Research (DBR) have been working with companies such as the CBC, the NFB, Telesat Canada, and CTV in Canada, PBS and HBO in the United States, and NHK in Japan to iron out details of the two events.

NHK, the Japanese national broadcaster, is providing a significant amount of HDTV encoding equipment for the demonstrations, and Telesat Canada is providing the satellite transmission facilities for all the demonstration sites.

Shopping centre and "living-room style" demonstrations of HDTV are planned in order to obtain public feedback on how HDTV compares with current television.

From October 12-17, look for the demonstrations which are open to the public, at the Eaton Centre in Toronto, and the Carrefour Laval in Laval, Quebec. The Ottawa location has not yet been confirmed.

The Ku-band Anik C-2 satellite (DOC was in large part responsible for the development of Ku-band satellite technology) will be used to distribute the HDTV signal for the demonstrations, both in Canada and the United States. The information gathered will assist the Department in making long-term policy and spectrum decisions for advanced television systems.

Under the Safety Hat

Facts on Backs

When most people think of safety on the job they think of construction workers in hard hats on a building

Not so! The greatest percentage of work-related disabling injuries result from sprains and strains in an office setting, and the most serious is back injury.

If you are over 30, chances are one in three that some day the following may occur. You are going about your business as usual. You bend down to pick something up off the floor or tie your shoelaces. As you bend, a sudden stabbing pain knifes through your back immobilizing you on the spot.

You have just become another back injury statistic. Welcome to the club. In Canada, 18 percent of all injuries among federal government employees are back injuries, and they occur most frequently to administrative support staff.

For example, a single box of continuous-run computer paper weighs over 25 pounds, enough to put a real strain on the back if not lifted

In fact, Occupational Safety and Health (OSH) Standard on Materials Handling (Vol. 12, Personnel Management Manual) states that it is obligatory for anyone who has to lift in excess of 10 kg (22 lbs) to be instructed and trained on the safe method of carrying loads. Employees are in fact prohibited from doing so until this training is completed.

Your safety is the direct responsibility of your immediate supervisor and, conversely, you are responsible for the safety of those who report to you.

Be responsible for yourself too - a pat on the back is better than a strain

DOC and CRTC Help Close Illegal Rebroadcasting Station

The combined efforts of the Department of Communications and the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CTRC) have resulted in a successful court action to put a stop to the illegal operation of a television rebroadcasting station in Vulcan, Alberta.

DOC was concerned about the possibility of the Vulcan facility interfering with authorized radio communications of police and ambulances as well as with other television signals.

As early as November 1984, the CRTC and DOC received complaints from Saskatoon Telecable Limited, a licensed company which was losing business to the unlicensed system.

Complaints from the public were directed to Alberta Consumer and Corporate Affairs (ACCA). The ACCA received letters from consumers who had paid sums of up to \$900 but were not getting the goods or the services that they had purchased.

For instance, one letter came from a man in Gibbons, Alberta who said that he paid the company \$200 toward the price of a satellite dish to be supplied and erected in his back yard; he never got the dish.

On December 6, 1985, the Minister of Communications advised the Central Region to investigate the Vulcan facility and the CRTC to investigate the company's corporate offices in Calgary.

DOC radio inspectors, accompanied by RCMP constables, searched the station in Vulcan and seized radio equipment. Photographs of the installation were taken and video recordings of the transmitted signals were taped.

At the same time, CRTC and RCMP officials searched the company's Calgary offices and seized documents relating to Broadcasting Act infractions.

The Deputy Minister signed a Prosecution Order on December 5, 1986, stating that court action should be taken against the company, its manager John Thomson and company director Judy Donaldson for operating radio apparatus without a licence required by the Radio Act.

During the court proceedings, the Crown withdrew all charges pertaining to Donaldson after accepting the pleas of guilty entered by Thomson and 307705 Alberta Ltd.

Judge Leo Collins sentenced Thomson and his company, 307705 Alberta Ltd., to pay a \$9,000 fine for the maximum allowed under the Radio Act and the Broadcasting Act, because the station was operated without a Technical Construction and Operating Certificate (TC&OC) and a valid licence.

The sentence was handed down May 1 and Thomson was given three months to come up with the funds.

In June 1987, a forfeiture order awarded the equipment that was seized in the search of the Vulcan station to the Crown. Forfeiture action is currently being undertaken and the hardware will then be disposed of since it cannot be licensed in Canada.

Helping Hands in the Mailroom

Every year, John and Don spend six weeks with each disabled person conducting these assessments based on the disabled person's ability to handle various clerical and mailroom tasks.

According to Jeanne Riendeau, a Vocational Re-habilitation Social Worker, John and Don provide very good assessments, and the office environment and encouragement of the mailroom staff contribute to the disabled person's self-confidence and ability to obtain future full-time employment.

Outside the mailroom, John continues his commitment to helping people. He has been involved with the Boy Scouts for nearly 20 years, he is a volunteer with the Canadian Ski Marathon, and teaches skiing to the blind.

Approximately \$9.5 million dollars have been allocated to these projects with the federal government providing close to \$6 million and the province of Manitoba contributing approximately \$3.5 million.

The General Manager of CIDO, located at 100-93 Lombard Avenue, is Jimmy Silden. Ms. Silden was Director of the Cultural Industries Development branch of the Manitoba Government prior to her appointment.

carry, represent the common ties that bind these nations together.

Beyond its role as host, Canada has much to contribute to the summits. As a bilingual/multicultural country and an innovator in communications technology, we have both the political and the practical skills to get people talking.

At the Quebec Summit, Canada, through the Department of Communications, proposed the creation of an international French-language Distance Education Centre. The aim of this project is to establish an international network linking French-language universities and training institutions and to disseminate existing programs or courses in various fields.

Discussions were held concerning plans to introduce TV5 in North America. TV5 is the European satellite television network currently distributing French-language programming to 17 countries in Europe and North Africa.

In addition, two Quebec literary works published under the Frenchlanguage Pocket-book Collection Project — L'Amélanchier, a novel by Jacques Ferron, and Ces enfants de ma vie, a collection of short stories by Gabrielle Roy — were introduced to the Summit participants. Future initiatives under this project to promote the development of French literature were also discussed.

Following the Symposium of Francophone Informatics and Software Experts, convened in Montreal from May 29 to June 6 as a prelude to the Summit, discussions were held on the status of automation in different countries and how to help foster conditions for increased production and exchange of French-language software and data banks.

Two of the major communications initiatives the Government of Canada will be exploring at the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting are:

- •A Commonwealth Centre for Distance Learning which, with the use of satellites, could reach developing nations quickly and efficiently without having to rely on college and university campuses and on roads and bridges.
- •A Commonwealth Television Program Service (CTPS) that would enable Commonwealth broadcasters to receive high-quality programming and contribute their own programs for viewing in other member countries.

In addition, the Department sponsored cultural events, including a minifestival of Francophone films in Moncton, Fredericton and Caraquet to coincide with the Quebec meeting. The Department will also sponsor a Cinema of the Commonwealth film festival in Vancouver. This is a showing of the best films from all Commonwealth countries. In addition, DOC will host a Commonwealth Drum Festival in Vancouver featuring 75 master drummers and percussionists from Commonwealth countries.

Through these initiatives, the Department hopes to "bridge the gap" between distant countries by promoting cultural exchanges and sharing Canada's expertise and know-how in communications and information technologies with other countries.

Students Earn and Learn at DOC Across Canada

Over the past year at DOC, the Career Oriented Summer Employment Program (COSEP) has proven to be a great success, both to students and DOC employers. Through the program, students acquire practical experience in their field of study and managers benefit from their enthusiasm to learn.

During April each year, DOC managers submit requirements for summer help to the personnel officers who then access a master computer which stores names of COSEP students looking for summer work.

This past summer a total of 62 students earned and learned at DOC through the COSEP program.

The Pacific Region hired two students, Central ten, Quebec (including CWARC) 23, Atlantic three, and Headquarters plus CRC employed 40.

From headquarters, Hélène Brunet, a summer student in the Finance Sector, provided us with a student's perspective on working at DOC.

"The best parts of this job are the people and the business experience provided by the COSEP program."

The worst? "Because the department is so big you only see a small portion of section responsibility."

From a manager's point of view, Jan Skora, Deputy Director General, Central Region, was asked to comment. Jan says the value of the summer student program to the permanent staff is a "positive, useful thing. The students bring a new and much needed perspective to the office."

Because of this kind of positive feedback we hope to continue this program next year.


